WOMEN RULE AT THE MUSEUM OF BRISBANE

THEY don't usually encourage people to paint on the walls at the Museum of Brisbane, but they made an exception in the case of Emma Coulter.

The acclaimed 4l-year-old Melbourne-based artist was invited back to her hometown to do a colourful mural to celebrate a major new exhibition.

New Woman, which opens today at the Museum of Brisbane, encompasses all our major female artists. Emma Coulter was born and bred in Brisbane, studied at QUT and said she was thrilled to have been asked back to decorate the museum's Dome Lounge with her brightly coloured large-scale, site-specific work.

"I came up the week before last to complete it," she said.

"I do my own work, but it is so big, I needed an assistant. The exhibition is fantastic and I'm pleased to be part of it."

The exhibition features a snapshot of artists across 100 years and includes some well-known names including Margaret Olley (Apples on a Table, inset top), Vida Lahey (Daphne Mayo, inset mid-

dle), Betty Quelhurst (Flowering Trees Brisbane, inset base), Daphne Mayo, Tracey Moffatt, Davida Allen, Judy Watson and many more.

There are 110 works in all, hung salon-style from floor to ceiling.

Museum of Brisbane director Renai Grace said the exhibition would build a richer understanding of the leading role women have played in the cultural life of Brisbane. "New Woman will reveal the stunning works of female pioneers, their evolving practice and the identity of women artists in Brisbane," she said.
